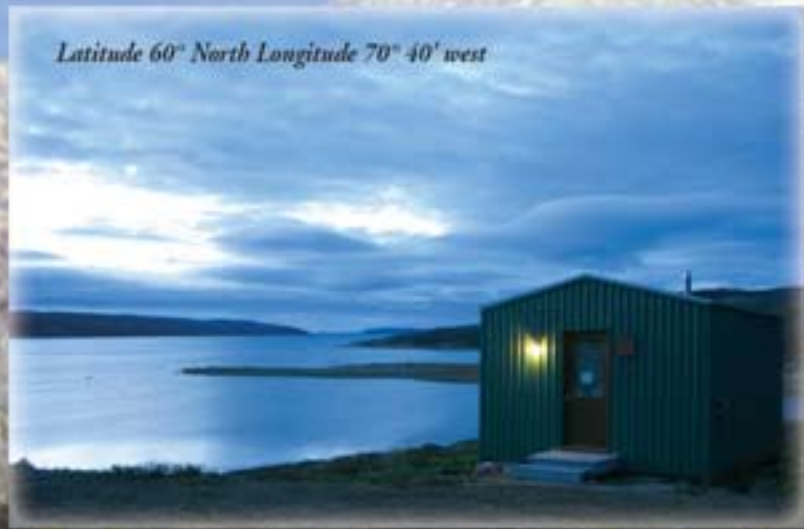


The Venues ...

FISHING CAMP



The Payne River is a major Arctic river which is the main watershed for Quebec's northwest tip and it flows into Ungava Bay. The Payne River Fishing Camp is located 25 miles upriver from Ungava Bay and the Inuit settlement of Kangirsuk. The tides, which are among the most significant in the world, reaching 40 miles inland, and measuring 30 feet deep, drain and fill the Payne Fjord twice a day.

You'll fish the tidal schedule, going out and coming back on high tide, for powerful and explosive Arctic Char ranging from 4 to 12 lbs.



The Fish ...

ARCTIC CHAR

“High-octane silver rockets ... the best fighting fish you can catch in numbers!”

Arctic Char may be the last best kept secret amongst fishermen. A schooling fish, char are aggressive and will readily take, or attack, an appropriately presented fly. Once hooked up, hang on! Pound for pound the Arctic Char takes a back seat to no other fish. And, while their initial run is breathtaking, they are certainly not one-run wonders. Sustained, multi-run fights are the rule!

The char in the Payne River run from 4 to 12 lbs. with the camp record being 18 lbs.

You'll marvel at how a fish of this size can fight. Good equipment is a must. Fried reels are not uncommon.



The Fishing ...

This isn't just a fishing trip, it's an adventure! 30 foot tides; Inuit guides; 24 foot freighter canoes; icy, brackish water; rugged, raw beauty; BIG river. And world class fishing for char. It's not uncommon to catch over 50 Arctic Char on a fly rod per day! As the tide empties the fjord it concentrates the fish. You'll either fish from exposed banks or from a freighter canoe anchored in current. You'll fish large streamers down and across the current, stripping the fly quickly to entice a strike. And strike they do! When they feel the hook, *hold on!*
