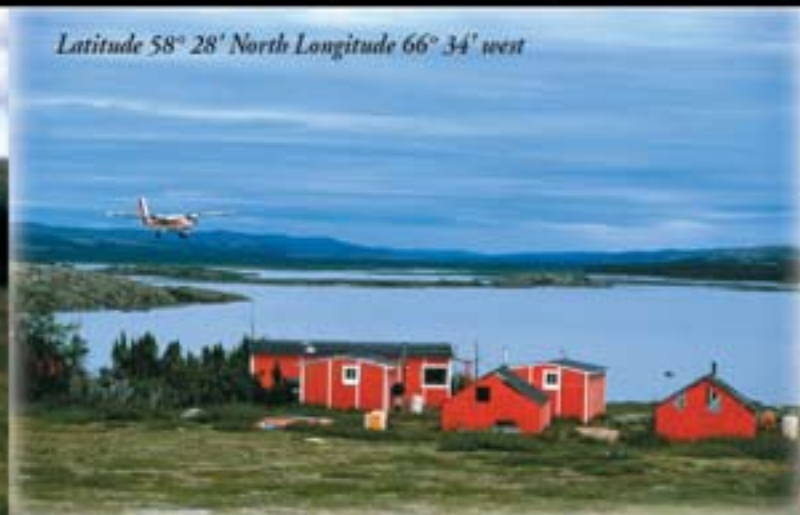


Latitude 58° 28' North Longitude 66° 34' west

TUNULIK II

FISHING CAMP

The Tunulik II Fishing Camp sits on an exposed granite bluff overlooking the Lagrevé River, 1 1/2 miles inland from Ungava Bay. Below camp you'll wade and fish waters seldom more than 100 feet wide for fresh, 1 to 3 lb. sea-run Brook Trout. Above camp, you'll take freighter canoes powered by jet outboards to access seven miles of pools and runs where you'll wade for more sea-run brookies and some monster native brookies (up to 10 lbs.!).

This remote camp is open for just 3 1/2 weeks each year during the peak of the sea-run Brook Trout migration from late August to mid-September.

Tunulik II and the Lagrevé River offer multiple species including Arctic Char, Brook Trout and, on rare occasions, Atlantic Salmon. But, truth be told, fishermen come for the Brook Trout.

The sea-run brookies migrate up the river in quantity. They are lightly colored from their time in the ocean and they’re quite aggressive and scrappy because they are hungry. Catching countless 1 to 3 lb. sea-runs is nothing short of addicting. But it’s the 2 to 6 lb. natives that steal the show. There are few places on earth where you can catch trophy Brook Trout like these.

With just 6 people in camp, you'll fish 3 to a guide and either focus on the sea-run brookies and char below camp or go upriver by boat to pursue natives.

Fly fishing for the sea-runs is about as action-packed as fresh water fly fishing can get. You'll find that these fish want to chase a moving fly. And they *will* spank it! Hundred-fish days are possible!

The big native brookies require more patience and finesse. You'll fish pools and runs and you'll work for these fish. The reward, however, is worth it. A trophy Brook Trout is tough to top!
